Key Selection Criteria

- Permanent body of still water
- Low to moderate ambient winds SE Qld +50 km from coast
- Suitable for both rowing and kayaking
- Capable of accommodating 8 x 2000m lanes min., warm –up circuit and training circuit for kayaks
- Existing infrastructure preferred
- Demonstrated positive Sport legacy
- 45 minutes by bus from athlete village
- 10,000 spectator capacity
- Access
- IOC capital cost guidance





Selection process

- Permanent water storages in SE Queensland reviewed
- Five options identified for further assessment including wind rose analysis
- Three options greenfields, one partially developed and one fully developed (interstate)
- Assessment involved EKS (international specialist consultant to the Bid Taskforce), Queensland Bid Taskforce, Rowing Queensland and Rowing Australia. Civil Consultants were engaged to provide capital cost estimates
- Venue Legacy Business Plan prepared by Rowing Queensland for selected site
- Selected site endorsement Rowing Queensland → Rowing Australia → Bid Taskforce → World Rowing → IOC



Why QSRC - Lake Wyaralong

- Permanent body of still water
- Established as the Queensland State Rowing Centre
- 10 lane course with capacity to accommodate warm-up and training courses
- Favourable wind conditions +50 km form coast
- Fair course, rowable in all but most severe (westerly winds) = athlete experience
- Favourable layout for spectators and infrastructure requires re-development of facilities
- Iconic Australian bush location
- Capital cost

Challenges

- Travel time form athlete village = satellite village
- Access







Design and Development Concepts

- Course turned through 180° N-S and moved to the west
- Current QSRC Headland to be abandoned with new development on Western peninsular
- New road access
- Training course constructed in western arm
- Warmup loop behind start
- Design to be fit for purpose, steel, colour bond, concrete and grass surfaces
- Permanent structures, finish tower, boat sheds, stand, office and first aid facilities, pontoons, ablutions and boat trailer and car parks
- Moveable held starting and held start platforms
- Temporary stands, ablutions and media centre to host spectators
- Ownership to remain with Rowing Queensland business case supports future operations




Conceptual Layout













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
